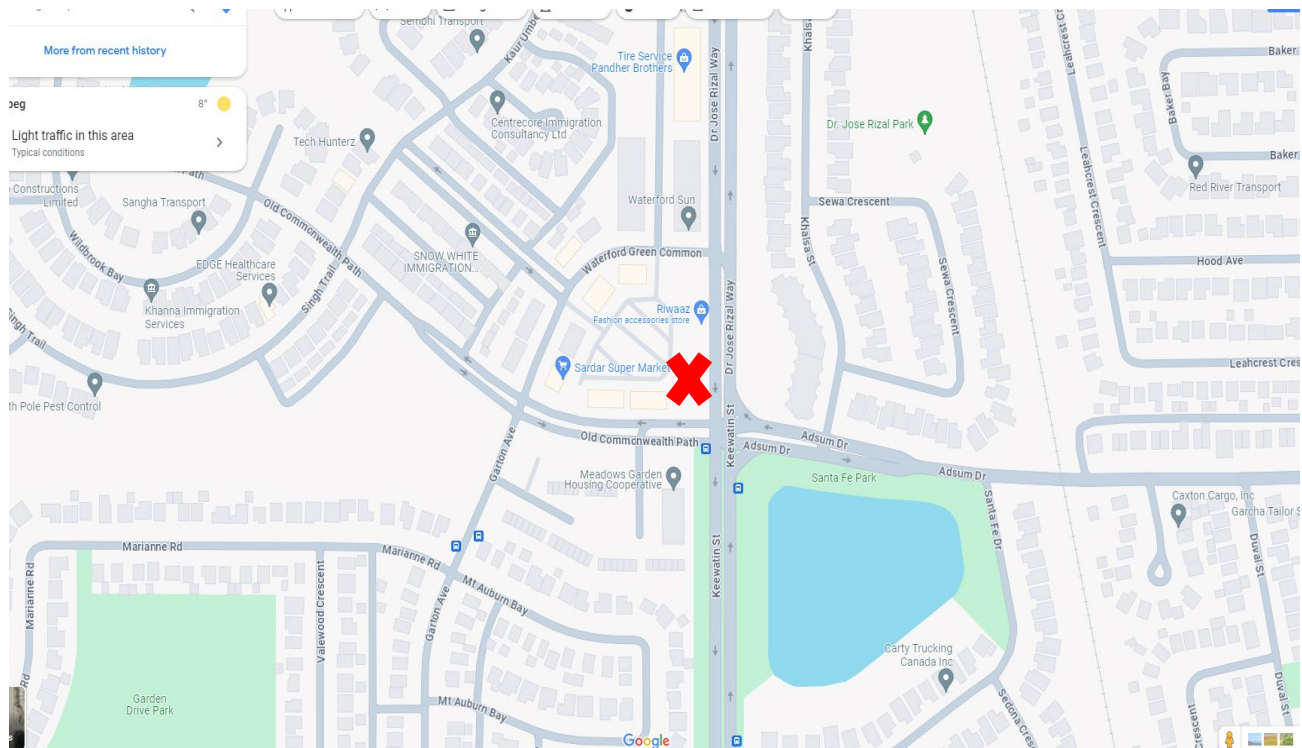
Name of Request: Adding to a Historical Marker: Dr. Jose Rizal Statue

Project Details:



The Order of the Knights of Rizal Winnipeg Chapter Inc is being gifted with a plaque from the National Historical Commission of the Philippines that recognizes the historical significance of the life, work and martyrdom of Dr. Jose Rizal. Dr Rizal wrote novels in the late 1800s and those novels exposed the tyranny of the Spanish rulers in the Philippines. He was eventually executed for being outspoken about his political views.

Each chapter around the world is being gifted one of these plaques to demonstrate the breadth of Dr. Jose Rizal's influence and significance to the Filipino community as they have immigrated to other countries. This is a sharing of pride and culture. The Order of the Knights of Rizal Winnipeg Chapter is thrilled to be receiving such a wonderful gift and would like to have this plaque added to the statute of Dr. Jose P. Rizal that was dedicated in the summer of 2019-2020.

This new plaque that is being donated by the National Historical Commission of the Philippines is not going to be able to be adhered to the existing statute. Instead, the Chapter would like to have permission to install a new pedestal nearby that the new plaque will be affixed to.

How does this renaming contribute to a 'Welcoming Winnipeg', as defined in the policy and what kind of evidence/research can be provided to support this state

Dr. Jose Rizal was a strong advocate for representation of the Philippines in the Spanish Parliament and equal legal rights for Filipino citizens. His literary works served as a catalyst for the widespread resistance against Spanish oppression in the Philippines. Rizal's arrest and eventual execution on December 30, 1896, further fueled rebellion and intensified the Filipino struggle for liberation.

Spanish colonization of the Philippines from the 16th century onwards meant that many aspects of the country are now linked to Spain and Roman Catholicism. The U.S. possession of the Philippines in the 19th century and during the Second World War meant that the Philippines did not become an independent nation until 1946.

The people of the Philippines and Indigenous peoples of Canada share some similar experiences and generational impacts of colonization. Both groups maintain their desire to decolonize, and are on their own respective journeys. Honouring Dr. Jose Rizal with this new plaque not only calls attention to the historical impacts of colonization around the world, but also recognizes the people who speak out against colonialism.
